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The route from Ramona through Santa Ysabel, Julian and Wynola is only 31 miles long, but it packs in more than 100 turns, making it a true driver's paradise. 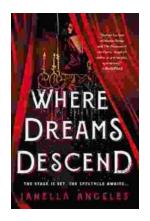


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
