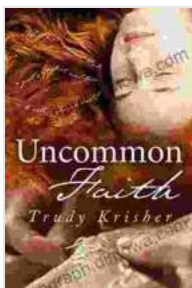

Legacy of Alice Paul

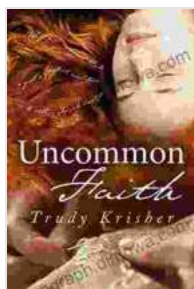
Alice Paul's legacy is immense. She is considered one of the most important leaders of the women's suffrage movement, and her work helped to pave the way for women's equality in the United States.

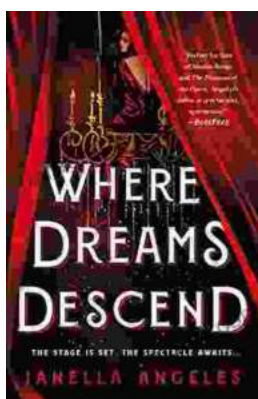
